SPEAKER WARNS OF EROSION OF GUNOWNERS' RIGHTS

Legislative Chair of the ACSL, and Chair of Firearms Owners Against Crime (FOAC)

PoliticsPA recently put Kim Stolfer, Chairman of

FOAC, Pennsylvania's largest pro-gun Political Action Committee, on it's list as one of PA's best political activists. After hearing his talk at the February meeting, that designation comes as no surprise. As a Marine in Vietnam in the 70s, Kim took his oath to "...support and defend the Constitution against all enemies, foreign and domestic..." very seriously. Thirty years later he still takes that oath to heart as he prowls the corridors of power in Harrisburg and Washington, DC. in his efforts to educate state and federal legislators as to their responsibilities to support and defend citizen' rights.

Kim uses a two-fisted approach to reach legislators. An example of his pro-active methods is the trip he organized for a March 14 visit to Harrisburg to spotlight the introduction of new legislation, as well as legislation already in progress, that will restore rights and the accompanying dignity to homeowners and gun owners alike. This legislation includes three areas Kim has worked on diligently over the past year or so.

• HB 2231. This bill supports the 'castle doctrine' that permits a homeowner to defend himself from intruders without having a duty to retreat. It gives the victim the right to stand his ground and meet force with force. It also prohibits prosecution for defending yourself, lawsuits by a criminal who was in-

- HB 544. This bill will require County Boards of Election to disclose to the public a list of all candidates in an election. This will, in turn, enable grass root groups to know who to target for issue related questionnaires so the groups can develop voters' guides.
- New legislation, to be introduced by Rep. Daryl Metcalf and Sen.
 John Pippy, that will end the registration database.



Stolfer's FOAC political action committee monitors and evaluates legislative initiatives and voting records of elected officials, and evaluates candidates for statewide office. This information is put in voter guides and distributed throughout the state. Gun clubs and gun owners who reference this material can be a deciding factor in every race in the state. Kim encouraged the members to join in and not be discouraged from being involved. "Join in and take it to a different level."

- A special congratulations goes out to the Mt. Lebanon High School Rifle Team. At the recent WPIAL team championship held at the Club range, the Blue Devils captured the bronze, missing sliver by one point. On top of that, the team grabbed another bronze at the PIAA state championships. And what's so special, you may ask? Well, all the shooters on the team are members of DMSC—Mat Brandt, Dave Braun, Arienne Cauchie, Cody Gonze, Lisa King, Molly Mathews, Tim May, Eric Ostergaard, Derek Stein, Kristi Webler, and Tom Yang. - Trout season runs April 15 at 8:00AM through September 4. Generally, on the state's inland waters the minimum length is 7 inches and the harvest limit is 5. Remember, from April 15 through June 15, bass are "no harvest—catch and release only".



DMSC HOSTS PENNSYLVANIA ENVIROTHON COMPETITION FOR WASHINGTON COUNTY

[Part one of two]

If you look at the Club calendar for March 30 and April 27, you'll see the notation "Envirothon 7AM-3PM". To most of us, that simply means that all the ranges are closed. But that two-day Envirothon event will be part of the biggest academic-conservation event of the year in PA.

The Envirothon at DMSC is a competition among local high schools as a prelude to higher-level state and international competitions. The program helps educate students in natural resource and environmental sciences. This year, the participating schools include Avella, Bentworth, Bethlehem Center, California, Canon-Macmillan, Chartiers-Houston, McDuffy, and Ringgold. Their performance will be tested and evaluated in four areas—soils/land use, aquatic ecology, forestry, and wildlife—plus a current environmental issue. This year the issue is Water Stewardship in a Changing Climate.

The students compete for \$75,000 in scholarships and Canon products. Last year, the PA winner, Penncrest High School in Delaware County, went on to capture the national championship at Southwest Missouri State in Springfield, Missouri, last July. This year the state final will be held at Penn State, and the winning team will compete in the international finals to be held at the University of Manitoba, Canada.

DMSC RIFLE TEAM COMES DOWN THE STRETCH ON A HOT STREAK

The Dormont-Mt. Lebanon Rifle Team continued to keep pace February 15 with a win against Clymer, Jason and Matt Piatt both firing 297. That avenged the previous loss to the boys from Indiana, and left the team at 9-4 — one match behind Murrysville.

DMSC controlled its own destiny. If it won against Murrysville at Murrysville the next week, it could force a tie for second place. The team might end up in a shootoff or win a head-to-head tie breaker.

Well, if the first Murrysville match was pretty even (1476 to 1475), then the February 22 contest was as close as fuzz on a tick's ear. The teams tied at 1475. When the scoring went to the off-hand tie breaker, DMSC found itself on top and in a second place tie with Murrysville. Jason Piatt and Fritz Hempelmann shot well off-hand and Dick Larry shot his highest kneeling of the year—97.

The streak continued into March. DMSC won at home against Allegheny, 1480-1450, with Matt Piatt shooting his highest score in several years—299, and being backed up by Tom Gerner's 298. This win, coupled with a Murrysville loss to Frazier, 1482-1477, put DMSC in sole possession of second place.

DMSC added another victory in its visit to Green Valley, matching the team's high score for the year with a 1482-1454 win. Chuck Hutchinson shot a 289, his highest score of the year. As coordinator Dean Trew says, the team "is on fire" going into the match against Frazier-Simplex.

PENNSYLVANIA FISH AND BOAT **COMMISSION NEWS**

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT EXPANDED AERIAL SURVEY EFFORTS THE 2006 TROUT STOCKING LIST

Where can I find information about adult trout stockings for the waters I like to fish?

The best place for the most accurate, up-to-date trout stocking information is the stocking portion of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission's web site. There you'll find listed hundreds of stream sections and lakes across the Commonwealth by county to be stocked, along with the date each is scheduled to receive fish. For those stockings that occur before the April 15, 2006, start of the trout season, the projected time and location the stocking trucks are to arrive is also published. For convenience's sake, the lists are broken down by county. Where there is more than one area of a stream being stocked, a description of the sections to be stocked is included. Due to circumstances beyond the Commission's direct control – weather, water conditions, traffic, etc. - that information is subject to change without much advance notice. The PFBC updates the schedule regularly.

What's different about this year's stocking list? For 2006 there is a new, consolidated format showing all the stockings scheduled for each water over the entire year. There used to be separate lists for those stockings that took place prior to Opening Day and those that took place during the open season. Now you can immediately see in a quick glace ALL the stockings scheduled for your favorite water this year. No more clicking on multiple web pages to find out the different stockings on the same water.

So no more pre-season and in-season lists?

That's right. This one list covers stockings throughout the entire year. And we've produced the lists this year quicker than ever so you have plenty of advance time to plan your fishing trips.

Does the new list show the number of trout to be stocked?

No. The Commission's long-standing practice has been to not provide water-by-water breakdowns of stocked trout numbers for waters stocked during the open season. These numbers were usually provided for stockings held prior to the season, however. The new format for the consolidated list eliminates this difference in approach.

PENNSYLVANIA GAME COMMISSION NEWS

UNDERWAY TO BETTER GAUGE DEER POPULATIONS

State Game Lands Included in Flights Covering more than 500,000 Acres of Woodlands

February 22. HARRISBURG -- Governor Edward G. Rendell today said Pennsylvania will be able to get a better grasp of the size of its white-tailed deer population now that an infrared camera-equipped plane is flying over more than 500,000 acres of Pennsylvania woodlands.

"We are working together to build a better understanding of how to both improve the health of the deer herd and regenerate our forests," Governor Rendell said. "This second round of aerial flights will build on our knowledge of how many deer are currently in our forests, and the number that the habitat can support so we can preserve our hunting heritage, as well as the economic and ecological future of our forestlands."

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the Pennsylvania Game Commission have identified more than 505,000 acres of state forest and game lands for flights in 2006 -- more than twice the acreage covered in 2005, the first year of flights.

MENTORED YOUTH HUNT PROGRAM TO BE ON BOARD'S APRIL AGENDA

February 27. HARRISBURG—With the recent enactment of legislation authorizing a "Mentored Youth Hunt Program," Pennsylvania Game Commission staff is working to develop proposed regulatory language for the Board of Game Commissioners to consider at its upcoming meeting on April 17-18. On March 6, the Board of Game Commissioners' Law Enforcement Committee will be meeting to review a preliminary draft of regulatory language to establish the Mentored Youth Hunting Program. After gathering the Commissioners Committee input, the staff will finalize the proposal to be included in the agenda for the Board's April meeting.

√ POTENTIAL ACTION ITEM

(If this legislation concerns you, you can contact your state Representative and respectfully ask him or her to oppose it.)

State Representative Dwight Evans (D-203), this week (March 10) was joined by Philadelphia City Council members Darrell Clarke and Donna Reed Miller in announcing House Bill 2483, legislation to gut state preemption and allow local control or regulation firearms.

Speaking in the Council Caucus Room at City Hall, Evans stated that his bill would provide local governments the option of approving an ordinance regulating such topics as:

- restricting areas where firearms may be discharged; limiting or prohibiting possession in areas of municipal or county parks or recreational areas or other publicly-owned grounds;
- regulating the brandishing of firearms or the manner by which a person may carry a firearm;
- regulating firearms in times of insurrection or civil unrest; regulating pellet auns:
- regulating pawn or secondhand shops;
- "limiting the ownership, possession, transfer or transportation of assault weapons within the city limits;
- requiring background checks or waiting periods on the purchase of firearms in addition to that required by state law; and, limiting the amount of firearms that may be purchased in a specific period of time or making it unlawful for a person who is not a licensed firearms dealer to

30-day period."
